
- Very Little Risk but High Profit




Cargo Theft by Trend and Year



Cargo Theft by State






Cargo Theft by County





Cargo Reporting Delays






Theft by Product Type

U.S.—Cargo Theft by Product Type **Q2-2019**





Last Mile Courier

- Increased activity in this area
- Often Targeting Pharmaceuticals
- Potential for higher frequency of violence
- Often minimal security procedures
- Minimal use of security devices or active tracking
- Sometimes internal involvement is suspected
- Route familiarity
- Driver complacency and attentiveness
- Recoveries are less impactful
- Less control over independent contractors

Identity Theft

Bad Guys steal the identity of a **legitimate Carrier** (sometimes because the Bad Guys worked for or with the legitimate carrier before). Bad Guys agree to haul goods for a Shipper or **Intermediary**, usually by finding the opportunity on a load board or other public source. Bad Guys show up pretending to be the legitimate Carrier and take the load and disappear with it. Carrier has no knowledge of this transaction.

LEGITIMATE CARRIER'S LIABILITY :

- Slight, if any, based on its responsibility for the theft of its identity
- Carrier Cargo Liability Coverage

INTERMEDIARY LIABILITY:

- Potentially higher risk of liability for hiring a thief
- Intermediary Cargo Liability Coverage

Identity Theft Methods

- Peruse, change Safer information
- Information change requests on your existing carrier pools
- Solicit false bids

TRAVELERS

- Generate false Acord Certificates and W-9's
- Change telephone and fax numbers/ cell cards
- Open and obvious information readily available

Fictitious Pick-Ups

Bad guys arrive at the pick up location prior to, or instead of, the intended and legitimately booked carrier. Most often, but not always, with the correct information and paperwork.

- Learning who picks up where
- Knowing where the best cargo is
- Sometimes lucky / sometimes have the information
- Fish load boards
- Cyber breach / cancel originally scheduled loads



Double Brokering Scam

· Good broker unknowingly hires bad guy trucking

• Bad Guy trucking double brokers load to legitimate carrier

• Legitimate carrier picks up load and begins delivery

• Bad Guy trucking tells driver to deliver to new address

• Bad Guy trucking pays driver

Technology

Cyber

• 3-D Printers

• Jammers

• Bar Code Scanning

- Law Enforcement has limited resources and personnel to address the issue of cargo theft locally and nationally
- Task forces are cut back or disbanded, have dual responsibilities, etc...
- Private industry participation and assistance is needed to combat cargo theft
